#### 1 Summary

Archaeological monitoring was carried out at Knights Manor, East Lane, Dedham during groundworks for an extension to the garage. Set within the grounds of an early 17th-century Grade II\* listed timber-framed house, the only features uncovered were an undated stakehole and tree-throw.




Fig 1 Site location.

#### 2 Introduction (Fig 1)

This report presents the results of archaeological monitoring undertaken by the Colchester Archaeological Trust (CAT) at Knights Manor, East Lane, Dedham on 28th April 2022. The work was commissioned by the homeowner and took place during groundworks for an extension to the garage (built in 2015) for a new gym and garden store.

In response to consultation with Colchester Borough Council Planning Services (CBCPS), the Colchester Borough Council Archaeological Advisor Simon Wood advised that in order to establish the archaeological implications of this application, the applicant should be required to commission a scheme of archaeological investigation in accordance with the *National Planning Policy Framework* (MHCLG 2019).

All archaeological work was carried out in accordance with a *Brief for Archaeological Monitoring*, written by Simon Wood (CBCPS 2021) and detailing the required archaeological work, and a written scheme of investigation (WSI) prepared by John Newman Archaeological Services in response to the brief and agreed with CBCPS.

In addition to the brief and WSI, all fieldwork and reporting was done in accordance with *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MoRPHE)* (Historic England 2016), and with *Standards for field archaeology in the East of England* (EAA **14** and **24**). This report mirrors standards and practices contained in the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists' *Standard and guidance for archaeological watching brief* (ClfA 2014a) and *Standard and guidance for the collection, documentation, conservation and research of archaeological materials* (ClfA 2014b).

#### 3 Archaeological background

The following archaeological background draws on the Colchester Archaeological Trust report archive and the Colchester Historic Environment Record (CHER MCC/DCC/ECC numbers, accessible for viewing via Colchester Heritage Explorer (https://colchesterheritage.co.uk/map).

Knights Manor is listed as a 16th-century Grade II\* listed timber-framed house (NHLE 1273808; MCC3903). However, a historic building survey carried out in 2013 concluded that the building dates from *c* 1620 and that much of its present appearance is the product of an extensive Mock Tudor restoration in the 1930s (MCC3068).

The Castle House, 148m south-west of the development site, is a 15th-/17th-century Grade II timber-framed house with Grade II listed late 18th-century brick garden wall (NHLE 1239249-1239250). Beyond Castle House is Dedham Heath, shown on Chapman & André's map of 1777 (MCC9168).

Fields immediately to the north-east of the development contain cropmarks including a double-ditched trackway and a rectangular enclosure cut by the road (MCC9073). Excavations in these fields in 1959 revealed a Bronze Age ring-ditch (MCC9071) and early Roman finds from the rectangular enclosure (MCC9072).

#### 4 Aim

Archaeological monitoring was undertaken to excavate and record any archaeological deposits exposed by the groundworks.




Fig 2 Results

#### **5 Results** (Figs 2-3, Photographs 1-2, Appendix 1)

Foundations totalling 19.5m long by 0.5m wide and 0.75-1.0m deep were machine-excavated under the supervision of a CAT archaeologist. The stratigraphy of the site was as follows:

- modern debris/crush from the demolition of the previous temporary store (L1, 0.35-0.55m thick) overlay
- made-ground (L2, 0.35-0.4m thick), which sealed
- natural clay (L3, at c 0.75m below current ground level).

#### Cut into natural were:

- stakehole F1, 0.13m in diameter and 0.12m deep, and
- probable tree-throw F2 with irregular base, c 1.6m wide and 0.3m deep.

#### 6 Finds

Recovered from L1 (finds no. 1) was a fragment of modern bottle glass. From L2 (finds no. 2) were three fragments of medieval/post-medieval peg-tile (82g), one sherd (3g) of early medieval sandy ware (fabric F13) dating to the 11th to the early 13th century, two fragments of animal bone (40g) from a large mammal and two unidentifiable lumps of iron (38g). All of the finds have been discarded.

#### 7 Conclusion

Archaeological monitoring revealed two undated features, a stakehole and tree-throw, with medieval/post-medieval finds recovered from made-ground L2.




Fig 3 Feature and representative sections.
